
CARPET INSTALLED

FELLOW MAN INTERNATIONAL

Mission in Honduras

(Taken from the recent newsletter from Lisa Armstrong concerning the FMI)

Although Covid-19 has left both the governmental and nongovernmental Honduran medical communities depleted and overwhelmed, the medical staff and nurses of FMI continue to work tirelessly to meet the healthcare needs of the people. They are working with the Honduran Ministry of Health to provide care for as many as possible. The Center for Public Health has donated medicine and other emergency supplies. The staff is deeply concerned about the children and the elderly as the risk to the vulnerable is magnified by the

coronavirus pandemic.

In addition to caring for patients of the Clinic, they are making home visits.

After both Hurricane Eta and Iota passed through Honduras, many villages of the Mission's service area were cut off by flooding and landslides. The staff of FMI prepared food bundles, medications, and medical supplies while heavy equipment cleared the way for 4-wheel drive vehicles. FMI was the first to reach the people living in some of the more remote areas that had been isolated for nearly ten days. They are coordinating with the Ministry of Health to provide ongoing assistance to those most profoundly Christ's love in this way!

affected by the hurricanes.

Because hunger has always been a primary concern for FMI and there is now additional food insecurity for the poor due to the pandemic and the hurricanes, they have decided to temporarily shift the focus of the agricultural project from school lunches to feeding some of the most vulnerable. As Dr. Samira has traveled from village to village providing medical care, she has identified those who are malnourished or at greater risk. Deliveries of fresh chicken have been made all over the mountain to those struggling with hunger.

HERE'S SOME NEWS...

"PURPLE ZONE" OPPORTUNITY COMING IN JANUARY

Did that get your attention? No, it's not a road trip to Manhattan!

Preaching in the Purple Zone introduces a method of preaching called the sermon-dialogue-sermon process. This method expands the pastor's level of engagement on justice issues beyond the single sermon. Key to this endeavor is using a method of civil discourse called "deliberative dialogue" developed by the Kettering Foundation for finding common values among politically diverse participants. Preaching in the Purple Zone equips clergy to help their congregations respectfully engage in deliberation about "hot topics," find the values that bind them together, and respond faithfully to God's Word.

On January 10 you will be invited to a deliberative dialogue around the issue of economic security, that will begin after the sermon shared on January 3. In addition to the sermon on Epiphany Sunday and any thoughts it generates we will use a resource from the National Issues Forums website. Copies will be available here at the church or I can email you a pdf. Our discussion will take place via Zoom and a separate link to that meeting will be sent out. The follow up sermon on January 17 will reflect some of the ideas addressed in our dialogue.

The sentence that grabbed the pastor's attention for this topic was this, "As the nation slowly recovers from its worst recession in decades, it is a good time to ask how we can best take charge of the future so families can feel reasonably secure, parents can help their children prosper, and everyone can move toward a financially stable retirement."

Our conversation will divide us into groups and each person's viewpoint will be heard and respected.

This is related to the class our pastor took in November. It is also part of an ongoing process in our annual conference. Be watching for the link!

SUNDAYS AT WORSHIP

SUNDAYS AT WORSHIP

It's a new year! We've been waiting, praying that in 2021 we will begin to see changes around covid and begin to resume life as we knew it. Or will we? Have we discovered things that maybe weren't as important to us as we thought? Possessions? Use of time? Maybe the idea of making new year's resolutions is tied in with that as well. In worship this month we'll hear some old stories and think about them in new ways.

JANUARY 3 EPIPHANY

The story of the visit of the wise men continues the Christmas story with these final visitors. This year we take a different route to consider these wise men from afar. As we begin the process of hearing preaching from 'the purple zone' we'll hear their story from Matthew 2 alongside modern considerations of Economic Security. You can read more about the process we'll engage in elsewhere in this newsletter edition.

JANUARY 10 BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Things move quickly after the wise men depart. We read in Mark 1:4-11 how Jesus went to John in the wilderness. Their encounter and the subsequent baptism of Jesus mark a public beginning of ministry. Today we each remember our own baptism and consider how God calls us to be at work in the world.

JANUARY 17 HUMAN RELATIONS DAY

Today we hear the impact of our discussion on Economic Security from our deliberative dialogue. Again, you'll want to consult the article all about this. We heard how the wise men's gifts made a difference in the life of one family. Today, on Human Relations Day, the day before the observation of Dr. King's birthday, where are we in the search for beloved community? The reading today from John 1 includes Nathanael making assumptions about someone because of where they were from—maybe that's a good place for us to start.

JANUARY 24 ECUMENICAL SUNDAY

Each of the gospels tells of disciples being called to follow Jesus—and the story is a bit different in each of the four. In Mark 1:14-20 we read how Jesus called fishermen, but different kinds of fishermen. On this ecumenical Sunday what is our call?

JANUARY 31 FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

It's a fifth Sunday already! 2021 is moving right along. The gospel of Mark does the same, as the first written, there is a sense of urgency in the story. After calling his first disciples Jesus immediately travels to Capernaum, where he teaches in the synagogue and heals a demoniac. News of him starts to spread. We're five weeks into the new year, maybe we should think about how we spread the news and love of Jesus.

Worship takes place live at 9 and 11 every Sunday morning. We are live on YouTube, channel GBFUMC, at 9:00.
